The Adverse Childhood Experiences Study was conducted in the late 1990s by a physician from Kaiser-Permanente, a large west-coast health system. The researcher set out to determine whether adult health and quality of life outcomes could be correlated with adverse childhood experiences, like physical and sexual abuse. ACE scores range from 1-10. Based on the CDC's 2018 data, the higher the ACE score, the greater the likelihood of outcomes like early death, liver disease, chronic obstructive pulmonary disease, and coronary artery disease.

100% OF REFERRED STUDENTS SUCCESSFULLY ENGAGED WITH MENTAL HEALTH SERVICES



100% of pilot students who needed mental health services not only connected, but successfully engaged with community mental health services including both group and individual therapy. Our community has access to mental health services, even for students and families who may have challenging histories with local organizations. Community health workers help make sure students receive what they need.

79% OF FAMILIES ENGAGE IN HOME VISITS



Low attendance is often one symptom of many chronic issues families are finding difficult to manage. Others may include consistent food, transportation, and/or housing. Physically meeting families and kids where they are instead of calling is highly effective in understanding their entire circumstance, and developing next steps together.
